
Art Exhibition 7-27 March

President's Report

Well it seems like summer might finally be here after experiencing wetter and cooler conditions than had been forecast, the predicted hot dry summer turned into one with plenty of rain in January and with the wet and humid conditions everything has had a spurt of growth this season.

We ended the year having almost 50 volunteers and guests join us for our breakup/Christmas party which was a great success and a fun afternoon for all who attended. Thanks to all those who assisted by bringing food and setting everything up.

We have moved into this year with a full order book for plants for autumn collection, and benches at capacity with plants ready to go into the ground as soon as we get some good autumn rains which hopefully are just around the corner.

With the rain in Dec/Jan, our plants are looking in top condition and our volunteers are keeping busy pricking out fresh stock and completing orders. Last year we pricked out just over 50,000 plants and put in over 6,000 hours of volunteer work - another great effort by the volunteers.

Over the past couple of months we have given talks to the Box Hill garden club, U3A, our local Rotary club, and Monash City Council Gardens for Wildlife guides on the history of Greenlink and our current activities. Unfortunately a proposed visit by Box Hill Nth primary students had to be cancelled at the last minute due to rain, and hopefully we will be able to host a visit by them in the coming months.

On the 17th Feb we hosted a meeting of the local community indigenous plant nurseries, where we decided to form a cooperative amongst ourselves to assist and support each other in our efforts to strengthen our knowledge base and have a louder voice to the community about the role of indigenous plants. IT'S TIME TO LOOK DOWN

I don't know about you, but when I go bushwalking I spend a lot of time looking down! And yes, of course I love standing underneath the spreading canopy of a majestic old Eucalypt and spotting some of the native wildlife that calls it home.

But I also look down, especially as we move into the cooler months through autumn and winter.

The forest floor is a fascinating and complex ecosystem, and some of the most intriguing species are mosses - one of the most ancient plant groups on earth today.

But many of us might walk right on by, without noticing their diverse beauty, or appreciating their importance to the health of soils, and their role in storing carbon.

DAWSONIA SUPERBA

Common Name: Tall Dawsonia, Giant Moss

Height: 1-50cm

Form: Tallest selfsupporting moss in the

world

Flowers: Male and female reddish-brown flowers on separate plants

Habitat: Medium to heavy soils in wet, shady forests. Can be seen growing around Toolangi and Warburton.

Saltbush Dukkah

USING ATRIPLEX SEMIBACCATA

INGREDIENTS

1/2 cup dried ground salt bush leaves

1 cup finely chopped macadamias

1/4 cup sesame seed:

1/4 cup roughly chopped pumpkin seeds/pepitas

2 tbs coriander seeds

1/2 tbs cumin seeds

1 tsp ground peppercorns

METHOD

In a fry pan, toast the macadamias, pepitas and sesame seeds for a couple of minutes, continuously stirring to ensure they do not burn. Remove from heat, and place in a bowl to cool.

Place the saltbush leaves, cumin, peppercorns and coriander seeds into the fry pan to toast for 1-2 minutes or until browned. Take off heat to cool.

Once all ingredients are cool, place into a bowl and stir well until combined.

TIPS

Store in an airtight container for up to one month.

For those with a food processor, keep the nuts/seeds whole and blitz it all up once they are toasted and cooled.

Serve with salads, soups, dips of used as a crust on fish/meats!

DID YOU KNOW....

The word 'eucalyptus' refers to a single genus of trees. The word 'eucalypt' refers to a group of species that belong to multiple genera, including Eucalyptus, Corymbia and Angophora.

The term 'gum tree' refers to some species of eucalypts that exude a sticky, tannin-like substance called kino, more commonly known as gum.

This means that a gum tree is not always a Eucalyptus tree, that a Eucalyptus tree is not always a gum tree, and that a eucalypt can be a gum tree, a Eucalyptus tree, or both.

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
